

"It's All Above the Collar"

crowd of curious spectators, photographers and journalists gathered in the pouring rain in New York City on June 9, 1909 to watch a 22 year old woman turn the crank on a 1909 Maxwell DA touring car and begin her historical journey. **Alice Ramsey** would be the first woman to attempt a trans-continental drive from New York City to San Francisco. Her companions were her two sister-in-laws, **Nettie Powell** and **Margaret Atwood**, and a young friend, 16 year old **Hermine Jahns**. *None of her passengers knew how to drive*.

Alice Huyler was born in 1886, attended Vassar College and in 1906 at age 20, married 43 year old



John Ramsey, a prosperous businessman in Hackensack, New Jersey. Alice's father had encouraged her mechanical talents and she was eager to learn to drive. John Ramsey bought his wife a 1908 red Maxwell runabout and arranged for driving lessons. It had a two cylinder, 14 horsepower engine and a base price of \$825. Alice loved driving and decided to enter the Montauk Point Run, a 150 mile endurance run that started outside New York City and went to the lighthouse at the eastern tip of Long Island. Her driving skills at the Montauk Point Run caught the attention of the sales man-



ager from the **Maxwell-Briscoe Company** which was located in Tarrytown, NY. He saw the opportunity for a promotional advertising stunt and suggested to Alice Ramsey that she was going to be the first woman to drive an automobile across the United States of America.

For her trip the company loaned her a new dark green 1909 Maxwell. It had a four cylinder, 30 horsepower engine and a sticker price of \$1500. The auto was right-hand drive and had four gears, reverse and three forward gears. The 30 gallon gas tank was located under the front seat and the gas was measured by inserting a ruled stick. Top speed was around 40 mph. The Maxwell weighed 2100

pounds but with passengers, spare tires, parts, tools and one suitcase per person, it weighed 3500 pounds.

In 1909, only 155,000 Americans owned automobiles, out of a population of 80 million people. The **Maxwell-Briscoe Company** was the third largest automobile manufacturer at the time and they were eager for the publicity this trip would generate. Long distance motorists depended on the "**Blue Book**" which by 1909 had driving directions for most areas east of the Missouri River. The Wild West was exactly that – wild, and included an encounter with an Indian hunting party on horse-back!

The route the four women took brought them through Albany and Buffalo, NY, Cleveland and Toledo, OH, Goshen, IN and on to Chicago. While in Chicago they were invited to attend the **Cobe Cup**



Race at Crown Point. The race was won by Louis Chevrolet driving a Buick. They continued across lowa and crossed the Mississippi River on a wooden bridge at Clinton, Iowa. That summer Iowa had been deluged with heavy rain which turned the roads into what Alice described as "gumbo mud". The tires on the Maxwell auto were built on a canvas foundation, were only four inches wide and had no tread. It took them 13 days to get across Iowa using low gear and chains on the tires.



The women motored on through Grand Island, NE, Cheyenne and Laramie, WY, Salt Lake City, UT and Reno, NV. The roads in this part of the United States were nothing more than wagon trails and the Maxwell took a beating. Alice Ramsey was also her own mechanic. She dealt with a dozen flat tires, two broken axles, reworked the cylinders and repaired springs and shock absorbers. The Maxwell motor performed wonderfully despite the steep grades and elevations of the Sierra Nevada Mountains which the ladies found breathtakingly beautiful. They entered California and were met by a cheering parade of cars in Stockton. At last they boarded a ferry at Oakland and arrived in San Francisco on August 7, 1909. They were escorted by dignitaries in other Maxwells to a reception complete with photographers, press men and bouquets of flowers.






The four women had traveled for nearly two months and had covered 3800 miles; only 152 of those miles were paved! After this triumphant trip the ads for the Maxwell automobile stated that it was "The car for a lady to drive. It is simply perfect and perfectly simple. Get a demonstration in the same model as driven by Mrs. Ramsey." A few days later Alice Ramsey boarded a train and returned to her family in New Jersey. However, she did not stop driving. Between 1909 and 1975 she drove across the United States over

thirty times! In 1960 the Automobile Manufacturers Association named her "Woman Motorist of the Century".

I discovered Alice Ramsey through a display at the **Gilmore Museum**. In 1961, she published a book detailing her trip titled, "Veil, **Duster, and Tire Iron**". I was able to obtain the

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book from our library and enjoyed her narrative of their challenging experiences. In her later years Alice Ramsey lived in California where she died in 1983 at age 96. She was the first woman to drive across the United States and in 2000 she became the first woman to be inducted into the Automotive Hall of Fame. In a 1975 magazine article she was quoted with these words – "Good driv-

ing has nothing to do with sex. It's all above the collar."



Steel-bodied 1963 Corvette Rondine Still **Amazing Fans After 49 Years**

ere's a trivia question for you: Has there ever been a Corvette made of anything but fiberglass?

If you knew the answer is yes, then you probably know the story behind the 1963 Chevrolet Corvette Rondine, a rare prototype that was commissioned by the Italian coachbuilder Pininfarina – and was made of steel!

The unique Corvette Rondine set a record at the Barrett-Jackson Auction in 2008 when it sold for a

cool \$1.6 million to a Connecticut collector. Pininfarina had held onto the car in its museum for some 40 years and also displayed the Rondine at various events, including the 2005 Concorso d'Eleganza Villa d/Este as part of the coachbuilder's 75th anniversary, before finally deciding to auction it off.

Interestingly, Zora Arkus-Duntov, the first Corvette chief engineer, was a fan of the car and was once quoted as saying: "For the first time I now have a Corvette I can be proud to drive in Europe."

> While crafted in Italy, the Rondine still had its American roots since U.S.-born design legend Tom Tjaarda penned its sleek lines while working in Italy for Pininfarina. Tjaarda also designed the Ferrari 330 GT 2+2, Fiat 124 (which arrived in 1966 and featured many styling cues from the Rondine), and DeTomaso Pantera.

Rondine was much heavier than the stock Corvette. The front end slopes forward along a smooth curve that ends with a thin, horizontal chrome grille that provides air to the engine. This was an attractive yet practical design element to keep the engine cool. The side panel is accented by a sharp line originating from the grille. The angle runs along the front fender, through the side of the car and ends at the crest of the rear fender, giving the "Rondine" a slender, European look. The rear end features the celebrated "swallow tail" arrangement, which minimizes the visibility of the car's tail due to projecting rear fenders. Under the hood of the mesmerizing teal sports car lies a 327ci, 4-speed manual, fuelinjected V8 that pumps out 360 horsepower. The interior design remained pretty much like the GM version, though the stock seats were re-covered in sumptuous Italian leather and the floor covered with rich black carpet. The door jams were also chromed and decorated panels were fitted.

If you're wondering the reasoning behind making the Rondine in the first place, it was built for the 1963 Paris Auto Show, the result of a long-running relationship between GM and Pininfarina. Corvette enthusiast and historian Tony Thacker once told Corvette Fever magazine: "It was perhaps as a result of the friendship between (Corvette designer Bill) Mitchell and Pinin Farina,

the founder of the Italian design house, that a '63 Sting Ray found its way to Turin's Valley di Susa for Pininfarina to re-body in any way they wished."

As a styling exercise, the car has its good points. But based on the lukewarm reception from the public, the Rondine just never caught on as a possible Italian-American collaboration similar to the DeTomaso and was quietly retired to the company's museum. We'll stick with Larry Shinoda's original Sting Ray design, thank you.

Larry Warren, a past member, recently sold a Corvette and donated miscellaneous Corvette related items to the club for use as prizes. Some of the items were used for the Blessing, but the remainder will be given out as door prizes after the 50/50 drawing this evening. Be sure to buy a 50/50 ticket so you will be in the drawing.

Board of Director Reports:

Governor/VP: Simon Reiffer talked about his recent trip to the **National NCCC Convention** in Topeka, Kansas. He and Gloria had a great time. He has three convention lapel pins available if anyone wants one. He attended the governor's meeting at convention and then the regional meeting on June 19th. NCCC is discussing raising renewal dues and late fees. Late fees would go from \$35 to \$45 and dues for new members would

go from \$35 to \$45 for the first year. This would cost a new couple \$100. Simon plans to vote "no" on this proposal.

The date for next year's driving school will be May 18th and it will be in the same location as this year.






