**SECRETARY**: Discussion concerning publishing vote totals in election's resulted in a motion by Don Armstrong to read: We will not 'publish' total vote counts in future elections, however results would be available on a request basis from the Secretary. Motion 2nd by Carol Armstrong, passed by unanimously vote of board.

**PUBLIC RELATIONS**: John & Simon will be meeting with Pres Kool in the next few weeks. John plans to place the club meeting time/place in the State Journal, Corvette Fever, and other free publications for continued membership growth. He will also be contacting our newsletter advertisers regarding payments.

**POINTS:** Don presented proposed changes to the current point program (see copy in the newsletter). Objective being to create a 'more level playing field' for all members. After a few minor changes were made, Don Armstrong made the motion to accept the new point program as is, effective retro active to January 1st, seconded by Don Johnston, unanimously passed by Board. **TREASURER:** Bob reported current checking and savings balances. ## Capital City Corvette Club 2004 Points Program

The points program was created several years ago to encourage participation in club and regionally sanctioned events. Club events could be anything from a Mystery Dinner to a car show, rallye or any event put on our calendar and hosted by a club member. We try to follow a 30-day guideline as far as notification to all club members. In other words, we like to have the event posted for 30 days to give everyone time to schedule. In some cases this is not possible and the Board will review these instances on a case-by-case basis and make a determination. Regionally sanctioned events are generally defined as an event hosted by another NCCC club and having a Michigan Region sanction number. Car shows, competition events and rallyes are examples of events that would fall into this category. At the end of the year the points are totaled and the top ten point holders are given recognition awards at our annual banquet.

There should be a sign-in sheet at every club event. The chairperson or host is responsible for providing the sign-in sheet and for forwarding it to the Points Director at the conclusion of the event. If a club member participates in a regionally sanctioned event, you must notify the Points Director personally via email or other written notification. All sanctioned events accumulate NCCC competition points so the Points Director can then verify your participation and award the points.

The following list is the guideline used to award our participation points.

- One point for attending a CCCC General Membership Meeting or Social Event.
- One additional point for arriving at the Meeting or Social Event with a Corvette.
- One point for each CCCC or Regionally sanctioned/sponsored competition event attended as an entrant. A competition event is defined as having a Michigan Region sanction number. A maximum of 1 point per day will be awarded.
- One point for attending the annual CCCC Awards Banquet.
- One point for attending the annual NCCC Michigan Region Banquet.
- One point for entering your Corvette in any car show designated as a club event.
- One point for entering your Corvette in any parade designated as a club event.
- Two points for each CCCC elected office held or for serving as the Web Master of the club website.
- One point for writing an article used in the CCCC newsletter. The article must be at least ½ page in length. Articles are published at the discretion of the CCCC Editor. Articles or reports required by an elected officer are not eligible. Maximum of 1 point per year.
- One point for working at each CCCC sponsored or sanctioned competition, charity or fundraising event. A maximum of 1 point per day will be awarded.
- One point for each full day in attendance at the annual NCCC Convention. 5 points per year maximum.
- Two points for chairing or co-chairing a CCCC social, charity or fund-raising event. A maximum of 2 points per competition season will be awarded plus the worker or attendance point for the chaired event.
- Two points for chairing or co-chairing a CCCC sponsored race, rallye, concours, or car show event. 2 points per competition season will be allowed plus the worker or attendance point for the chaired event. Chair or co-chair must be instrumental in organizing and running the event. "Signature Only" chairpersons will not be awarded points.

Big Brothers Big Sisters mission is to help children reach there fullest potential by placing them in positive relationships with adult volunteer mentors. The most traditional way BBBS accomplishes this is through our Community Based, Core Program which is a one to one match with a child and volunteer. The volunteer sees the child three to four times per month and makes



an initial commitment of one year. The "Big" and "Little" choose the activities they participate in. Other ways of becoming

involved include our Club Connect Activities which occur once a month and serve the children who are not yet matched with a Big Brother or Big sister. Also, volunteers may choose to be a Big For A Day and take a child who is not yet matched and share in an activity with them.

BBBS matches the "Big" and "Little" based mainly upon personality and interest (while we will take other preferences into consideration as well, i.e. – location). If the interest lies in vehicles, working on them and appreciating them through various activities and events, the volunteer may involve the child in these activities with them. BBBS focus is on the friendship built with the child, and the benefits they receive by having a positive role model in their life. BBBS would strive to find children who would be interested in participating in similar activities, as well as exploring new opportunities with the volunteer.

**Core Program:** One-to-one match between a youth and a positive role model ("Big") for a minimum of one year; contacts are made 3-4 times per month.

**Group Mentor Program:** Area youth ages 12-15 meet once a month and participate in group activities with adult volunteers from the community, various organizations, clubs, and programs. Emphasis is on offering opportunity for teens to meet and interact with peers and adults in positive activities throughout the community. Positive adult role modeling and appreciation of diversity are major goals and strong points of this program.

**Bigs for a Day:** Volunteers participate in individual or groups activities with children who are not yet matched.

**Learning Center:** In partnership with the Lansing Police Department, Bingham Elementary, Christ Lutheran Church, this program places specific attention on Bingham Elementary school children at the Center two days per week for homework assistance, group learning and educational computer games. Volunteers consist of high school students and adult volunteers.

**Golf Mentoring:** (Summer only) At-risk youth ages 5-10 meet weekly for 8 weeks with adult volunteers to learn more about the wonderful world of golf. Golf skills, rules, and etiquette are taught and practiced each week. Social skills and working with others are also strongly emphasized.


**Lunch Buddies:** This program allows youth to visit with positive adult mentors during their lunch hour. Volunteers from nearby businesses and organizations meet with the child to sit, eat, talk, and give guidance. These matches get together for 45 minutes once week.

High School Mentoring Program: The High School Mentoring Program matches high school students with elementary students to develop caring, supportive relationships. Though the aim of the program is to support the child socially and emotionally, emphasis is also to encourage a positive academic experience. The mentor meets with the child at least twice a month -- once individually as a match and once in a group activity with all the matches in the program. BBBS organizes and funds the group activity. The mentor works with the child on school work and also spends time with the child in recreation and other activities. The High School Mentoring Program is not an open program, in that we do not accept high school students from a variety of high schools on an individual basis. We choose the high school and the elementary that will participate. This is based on the need in the elementary and the availability of mentors in a particular high school.




