

Member Profile Introducing: Art & Marilyn Ickes



Corvette History - February

- February 2, 1993: The term "STINGRAY" is registered as a trademark to General Motors.
- February 9, 1995: The first alpha test C5 Corvette enters public roads for the first time.
- February 11, 1962: At the Daytona Continental race,
 Dick Thompson and Don Yenko race a 1962 Corvette of the Gulf Oil racing team to first in A/Production class, and seventh overall.
- February 19, 1994: Reeves Callaway decides to produce a modified Corvette to race at Le Mans, the first time for a Corvette in almost 20 years.
- February 20, 1954: The Ford Motor Company shows the Thunderbird two-seat convertible in Detroit. The Thunderbird is a major part of General Motors' decision to continue production of the Corvette.
- February, 1955: The basic design of the 1956 model Corvette is completed.
- **February, 1966:** At the Daytona Continental endurance race, Roger Penske's 1966 Corvette with 427 ci engine finishes first in GT class.
- February, 1968: At the 24-hour Daytona Continental race, Sunray DX Oil Company enters three Corvettes. Jerry Grant and Dave Morgan race a 1967 L88 Corvette (car No. 31). Revson/Yenko race 1968 L88 Corvette (No. 29). DeLorenzo/Thompson race 1968 L88 Corvette (No. 30). This is the racing debut of the 1968 model Corvette. The Grant/Morgan car finishes first in GT class and 10th overall.
- February, 1993: General Motors Powertrain Division decides to discontinue development of the Gen II engine as a small-block, and create a new medium-displacement V-8 engine.
- February, 2000: The Rolex 24 Hours at Daytona is held in Florida. Chevrolet enters its two C5-R Corvette race cars. One places second, 31 seconds behing the winner. The other places 24th.

The History of the Corvette Part Seven C6: More power and style for less money (2005-Present)

Rather than start over with a clean slate, Chevrolet's engineers decided to take the best aspects of the C5 and build on them. The idea was to create a car that does more things well than performance cars costing two or three times the price. The chief goal for the new Corvette was to improve its refinement and performance while addressing every notable imperfection of the previous generation. At first glance, the 2005 Corvette appears to be little more than a styling refresh; dig deeper, though, and one quickly realizes that the C6 is much more. Exposed headlamps, not seen on a Corvette since 1962, combine with a lean grille to create a distinctive "face."

Addressing complaints of the C5's big rear end, the backside was slimmed down so as not to appear as disproportionate as before. In profile, the sharply cut lines that trail away from the side vents look as if borrowed from the Dodge Viper, yet the overall look still says Corvette -- even more so than the C5.

For the first time since 1968, an engine with 350 cubic inches (5.7 liters) of displacement is not offered under the Corvette's hood as the C6 uses a new 6.0-liter "LS2" V8 as its sole power plant. Output is an astounding 400 hp and 400 lb-ft of torque providing performance on par with the world's best from Italy and Germany.

According to Chevrolet, the Corvette rushes from zero to 60 mph in an adrenaline pumping 4.2 seconds continuing on to a top speed of 186 mph. The standard six-speed manual received serious upgrades, and the clutch is smoother and lighter with a shift feel that is precise and satisfying in its snick-snick shift quality. Three suspension setups are available, and it's important to note that not one single suspension part was carried over from the C5. The standard setup provides a comfortable and controlled ride, along with the kind of precise handling you would expect. The optional F55 Magnetic Selective Ride Control suspension adjusts the shock damping rates instantly in response to changing conditions. The result is an even more comfortable ride than the base suspension, yet better control during aggressive maneuvers. The Z51 package is the closest thing to "Z06-like" performance -- at least this year, that is. This package includes more aggressive dampers and springs, larger stabilizer bars, shorter transmission gearing and larger cross-drilled brake rotors.

Even in Z51 form, the 'Vette would make a perfectly acceptable daily driver. Regardless of suspension setup, the chassis manages to be both highly capable and forgiving. In the cockpit, everything from materials quality to overall ergonomics is vastly improved. The seats provide great support and comfort while plenty of headroom gives the cockpit an open and airy feel. The straightforward climate control setup is light-years ahead of anything else in the Corvette's segment. Only the mostly hidden button clusters that flank the gauges mar the superb layout. The standard removable top is now easy to remove and install, and can be handled by

one person. Gone are the days of erector set tools and ill-fitting connectors. Even the top storage brackets in the rear hatch were carefully engineered to keep a firm -- and quiet -- grasp of the stowed top.

With the C6, Chevrolet's engineers outdid themselves; the newest Corvette's handling is spot-on, the power train is smooth and scary-fast, the look is classy and the ergonomics top-notch. Making this all the more impressive is that the C6's base price is actually less than the outgoing 'Vette's.

From the Governor:

Taming the Tail of the Dragon October 26-29, 2006

A small group of members from CCCC (Dave, Diana, Lewis & Mike Kuempel and Rich and Brenda Shatkosky) decided a fall road trip/color tour to the Smokey Mountains bordering Tennessee and North Carolina was a fitting way to end the Corvette season.

The objective was to "tame the Dragon" "calm the Hellbender" and "bring the Skyway down to earth".

The caravan departed late morning on Thursday from Charlotte. After about 11 hours of elapsed time which including culinary stops outside of Indianapolis IN and Lexington KY and numerous (too many to count) other stops for the coffee drinking Kahouna, the caravan arrived safely in Alcoa TN. Alcoa is a small city of approx 9,000 people where the women outnumber the men (theoretically good news for Lewis and Mike). It is about 15 miles southwest of Knoxville and is a convenient starting point for touring the area. Alcoa and the adjoining Marysville feature a wide assortment of lodging and restaurant choices. The area is also only a few minutes from Smokey Mountain destinations such as Pigeon Forge, Gatlinburg, and Dollywood.

This makes Alcoa a great place to stage for daytime driving and evening shopping/entertainment. It would be easy to spend a whole week in this area and do both to your heart's content.

If exhilarating driving is what you are after, there is not much that beats driving the "Tail of the Dragon". This 11 miles stretch of US 129 straddling the Tennessee, North Carolina border features 318 curves, many of which are blind curves, hairpins, off camber or switchback. If you like driving the "twisties" this is "highway heaven".

We drove the 'Tail' and "Hellbender" on both Friday and Saturday. On Saturday we added the Cherohala Skyway.
