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DESIGNING WOMEN

y family only had one car when I was a young child which my father used every weekday to commute from our rural home to downtown Grand Rapids. One day a week the whole family got up early and rode downtown with dad so mom could have the car for the day. It was customary at that time for men to do the driving and for women to ride along. I had a friend whose mother never learned to drive. Eventually my parents bought a second car, the suburbs expanded and enveloped our rural area and women were in the driver's seat.

The early years of the automotive industry were definitely a man's world. Car without power steering, power brakes, automatic transmissions and the electronic features that are standard today took some brawn to operate. Harley Earl, known as the Father of the Corvette, was innovative in a multi-

tutde of ways and one of the things he envisioned on the automotive horizon was women as drivers and consumers.

Earl began his career at General Motors in 1926 and in 1927 he was appointed director of the art and color section. Ten years later his department was renamed the Styling

Section and in 1943 Earl hired the first women automotive designer. When addressing the design of his Dream Cars in 1956, Harly Earl wrote, "Of all the useful and beautiful products designer by Stylists, the best known and most appreciated is the American automobile, which ranks only second to women's fashions in the attention given to changing and improving its appearance."

By 1958 there were nine women with degrees in Industrial Design who were contributing their ideas to GM products. Three of them we designing Frigidaire appliances and exhibits and six of them were involved in automobile styling. Each of these six women worked with a team of five men and focused on color, texture and trim of interior fabrics and the shape of seats, door handles, steering wheels and armrests. These six women, Sue Vanderbilt, Marjorie Ford, Ruth Glennie, Sandra Longyear, Peggy Sauer and Jeanette Linder, achieved the pinnacle of their design efforts when Earl assigned the group to design ten automobiles for the Spring Fashion Festival of Women Designed Cars that were featured in the Styling Review Auditorium at the GM Tech Center in 1958. The article that follows, "Behind That Wheel", published in the April 7, 1958 Christian Science Monitor, describes the details of these

cars and the many design features that were incorporated into them.

Not everyone was enthralled with the concept of women designing cars and when a less enlightened Bill Mitchell took over the GM Styling Department in 1959, all of the women were demoted. He stated,



"no women are going to stand next an any senior designers of mine on any exterior styling of Cadillacs or GM's other major brands." Despite this stance, the women's ideas lived on and have contributed to many of the convenient features and graceful styling of the automobiles that we appreciate today, including our Corvettes.

Behind That Wheel

If the little women behind the wheel – and behind the man behind the wheel – will just raise her voice, General Motors will listen and give her anything – well almost anything – she wants in the cars it manufactures. And, moreover, the corporation invites her to write in and make her wants known.

For a long time General Motors has been conscious of the soft feminine voice that says: "I like this," or "I wouldn't be seen on the road in that." It is eager to give the ladies what they want, not only for the sake of the ladies but also for the sake of General Motors which is in the business to sell cars, Harley J. Earl, vice-president in charge of styling, candidly admits. Mr. Earl has 31 years with General Motors and supervision of the design or nearly 50 million cars to his credit.

In 1943, GM hired the first women designer to advise on the selection of color and fabric for car interiors as its initial gesture in the direction of the women car owner and the women's influence on the man who buys the family car – GM want to sell family

Now the corporation proudly boasts nine "Damsels of Design," at the GM Technical Center in Warren, Mich., all with graduate degrees, equipped to design nearly any type of consumer goods. Six of them are assigned to the automobile styling studios and the other three, to the Frigidaire appliances and exhibits.

They work on an equal basis with the men in this field to design. Incidentally, these young women range in age from 22 to 34.

Time for Ladies

"I don't know why the ladies shouldn't be represented in the designing of cars, refrigerators, and other appliances," said Mr. Earl at a recent conference to which women of the press had been invited. It was held in the auditorium of the Technical Center, where the women writers had been given a preview of the industry's first "Spring Fashion Festival of Women-Designed Cars."

The setting was a veritable symphony of spring, with 90 canaries making music and twice that many potted white hyacinths filling the air with fragrance.

The cars have since been put on public display, admission free, in the exhibit hall of the General Motors

They are done by women for women. There are ten cars in the group, two each of Chevrolet, Pontiac, Oldsmobile, Buick, and Cadillac, including six convertibles, a station wagon, and three hardtops with designs ranging from those to appeal to the sports-minded, wind-blown girls from the wide open spaces to the lux-ury-loving, buy women executive who dictates as she drives to her office from the suburbs.

The girls went to town. Not all of the elegant feminine features will be incorporated in 1959 cars, but probably some of them will be.

This time the women designers had their way only in the car colors and interiors, but the future may find women revolutionizing the whole car design, it was admitted. This is a day of which many men designers take a dim view. But now for the cars:

A highlight of Ruth Glennie's "Fancy Free" Chevrolet Corvette is a seat that can be fitted with slings to change the mood of the car in a wink. For spring, the basic seat insert is silver olive, a breathable, perforated leather, matching the solid-color exterior. For summer, there is a washable, lemonyellow terry cloth sling; for autumn, a nubby red-orange cloth; and, for winter, a silky black imitation fur.

The seats are specially contoured with built-up sides and pinched waist. Newly designed retractable, self adjusting plastic seat belts are included in this car.



All of the cars are solid color. Although, according to Mr. Earl, the

two-tone cars lifted business when they came in, and introducing white with colors helped sell more care, solid colors are returning by popular demand from the ladies. They're tired of two-tone models.



"We are always price-conscious in designing in all five car divisions," said Mr. Earl. One of the needs, some of the women of the press had stated, was for less costly cars. They also urged less chrome.

"So do some of the 1,500 to 2,000 people who write in ever year to say what they like and don't like," Mr. Earl replied; but here is where a strong masculine voice drowns out that of the little women – the masculine voice of the used-car dealer.

Two used cars change hands for every new car that is bought, Mr. Earl

explained. Therefore GM wants the used car to look smart enough and shine enough to attract a buyer, too. Paint gets shabby and marred before chrome does and it won't shine up as well for that second

sale; so chrome stays despite the little woman.

Also, new designs can't be so drastically different as to out date the used car so completely that nobody will want to buy it.

But chrome notwithstanding Mr. Earl credited women's influence with being responsible for development of automatic transmission, power steering, and power brakes, making cars easier for women to drive. He said the hump in the middle of the car floor is "a problem we're working on."

Nearly all the feminine cars have litter containers of some kind. There is a plastic lined one on "Martinique," a Chevrolet Impala Convertible done by Jeanette Linder. The over-all lucite paint is a pale yellow color. The top is white.

Umbrella, Of Course

A heavy-weave striped cloth in four pastel colors is used with seat bolsters of yellow. This cloth lines the trunk and covers the spare tire, and there is a fiberglass luggage painted to match.

Oh, yes, there's also a yellow umbrella held under the driver's side of the instrument panel. In fact, nearly every car has an umbrella tucked away in an ingenious pocket.

"Polaris," by Sandra Longyear, is a Pontiac Bonneville convertible, blue with chrome, the interior with black leather and intense blue fabric combined. A special feature is a compartment for picnic supplies between the front seats, also a "Sportable" radio which can be lifted out.

Miss Longyear also did "Bordeaux," a Pontiac Star Chief four-door



hardtop, which includes special straps in the trunk to keep groceries upright. The car is heather green, with the color

carried out in leather and fabric inside. Slash pockets for maps are located on front doors.

In "Carousel," an Oldsmobile Super 88 station wagon, which has many practical features, Peggy Sauer went one better on the door pockets and made them removable to carry as underarm briefcases.

In this car the front is for adults and the rear for children. Doors and windows here can be released only by Mom or Dad from the instrument panel; hardware has been removed from the rear doors as a safety feature for small riders, and the floor is covered with preformed sponge rubber. Seats and floor are washable. A spilled ice cream cone would be no problem.

Elastic bands on the back of the front seat provide temporary storage for caps, mittens, teddy bears, etc., and a magnetic panel on the same area holds toy cars for the children's entertainment. In front, for adults, are tube-like containers under the instrument panel for the ubiquitous umbrella and the "Trans-Sportable" radio.

Miss Sauer also did "Rendezvous," the Oldsmobile 98 convertible, in rose metallic paint, with black and red hand-woven fabric inside. The back of

the front seat on the driver's side holds a small folding suitcase of matching red leather. On the passenger's side is a compartment for gloves, shoes, and other accessories. Radio and umbrella are in this car, too.

Marjorie Rod, for a special convertible Buick that she named "Tampico," used alabaster with accents of flaming orange. Travel and sports equipment are in a compartment between the bucket seats. A transistor radio can be removed for use outside.

She also did "Shalimar," a Buick four-door hardtop, in royal purple,

with black and royal purple interior. Here a dictating machine is ready for the women executive.

In "Saxony," a Cadillac convertible done by Sue Vanderbilt, in gray-green inside and out, is a Dictaphone which she describes as ideal for a running commentary on the trip. Umbrella, mapholder in glove box lid, waste container under instrument panel, pockets on the back of the front seat, and carpeted trunk are other features.

She calls a Cadil-

lac Eldorado Seville two-door hardtop "designed especially for a fashion editor on a top woman's magazine," "The Baroness." Over-all colors are black and beige with black mouton carpet and accents. This elegant car has a telephone, note pad, pen, change maker, and extra compartment. The umbrella is in the right arm rest; the trunk, or course, carpeted.

Editors Note: While not all pictured cars are the actual show cars referred to in the article, they are actual production 1959 models that may have design elements from the lady designers.



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
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
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
